A Ruby Anniversary

A Ruby Anniversary! That is what Fr. Larry P. Crawford will be celebrating on May 1, 2006. Reaching such a milestone is not a small feat. What did it take to get here?

Fr. Larry Crawford was born in Owensboro, KY on July 26, 1940. He was one of four children in his family. His father moved the family to Tell City, IN in 1943 to take a job at Kinrad Corporation, which made radio tubes. For a person that did not have a high school education, Fr. Crawford's dad was wise enough to know that education was important. He was determined that his children would be educated so after the war, he moved the family yet again, this time to Indianapolis, IN. Fr. Crawford began his education at St. Catherine Grade School on the south side of Indianapolis. For high school he was sent to St. Meinrad Seminary. While at St. Meinrad, he completed a Bachelor of Science degree in Biology and his theology studies. In all Fr. Crawford was at St. Meinrad for twelve years. When asked when he received his call, he does not recall any specific moment or event. He does remember, however, as he puts it "The week before my ordination, I had a serious conversation with myself." The Holy Spirit was obviously at work and Fr. Crawford was ordained as a priest for the Archdiocese of Indianapolis on May 1, 1966. At that time the Archdiocese required priests to be able to teach school,

so Fr. Crawford began to pursue graduate studies in Biology at Notre Dame.

The first assignment that Fr. Crawford received was as the Assistant Pastor at Holy Spirit Eastside in Richmond, IN. This assignment lasted for 2 ½ years. As we all know, Fr. Crawford is not content to do just what is necessary and so while in Richmond, he accepted responsibilities as the Deanery Director for Catholic Youth Organization (CYO) and the Chaplaincy at Richmond State Hospital.

Fr. Crawford's first term at St. Gabriel the Archangel began in 1971. He worked under the leadership of Fr. Larry Frye. Fr. Crawford respected Fr. Frye and they developed a good friendship in addition to a great working relationship. His performance at this assignment and the previous one, gave the Archdiocese the confidence that he was ready to be in charge of a parish.

Holy Trinity, a church of Slovenian roots, on the west side of Indianapolis was the chosen assignment in 1976. I believe that this pastorate was the one that Fr. Crawford is most proud of to date because he was able to lead to church into new directions for growth and vitality. When he arrived at Holy Trinity, the school had just been closed and the notion was that he was there to close the parish. The church had so much of its identity tied to the school that they did not know how to exist without it. The next nine years would move the church into new ways of being. It began with a lot of empty building space - a large school building and a convent. Fr. Crawford saw this as an opportunity to increase this church's influence in the community beyond its doors. There was a fledgling daycare at Holy Trinity of about 10 kids. Fr. Crawford asked a mother of 8 kids if she would consider taking on the daycare. She agreed, did it for twelve years and built it up to about 200 children. Part of the empty convent building was rented to a local barber college to keep the building used and provide some additional resources to the church. At this time it also happened that the office of Catholic Charities had flooded and they needed a new home. They rented that part of the convent that was not being used by the barber college students. With the convent fully occupied now, the next

Dave and I rented one half of a double in Valley Mills. At the time I attended Mass at St. Ann Church on Holt Road and also at St. Anthony. A year later friends of our bought a house and talked us into buying one, too. And so we did.

The big selling point was the fact that a Catholic church was to be built on west 34th street. Since I didn't drive I could walk to church every Sunday with my children in tow. I did this for ten years. We only lived down the street.

After St. Gabriel church was built, I registered but was not involved until 1988, when I went on the renewal. The Lord sure changed my life from that point on. I joined the Women's Club, the Welcoming Committee and was an Usher/Greeter. Presently, I am on the St. Gabriel Herald staff and the Bereavement Committee. I work on all the church mailings and do the laundry each week for Fr. Crawford and Monsignor Easton.

The Bowman family subsequently added three more children to its ranks. We now have three sons and two daughters. Dave passed away in March 1998. He loved St. Gabriel and became a Catholic in 1991.

The people of this parish have given me so much love and support, I couldn't be happier being a member and plan to always remain here.

Incidentally, I now have a driver's license!

As you walk through the halls of St. Gabriel School, there is a force at work to make the school the best it can be. That force is the Home and School Association. Many may ask what is the Home and School Association? Every teacher, staff member and parent is a member of Home and School. In addition, there is an executive board: President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer. Those four individuals are responsible for carrying out Home and School policies and overseeing all the activities it supports.

Over the past year the Home and School has revamped it's mission to become the main communication link between the home and the school. Parents are encouraged to attend the monthly meetings to share their concerns and ideas. To further its mission the Home and School seeks out parents to become room parents for each classroom. Room parents play a vital role in the success of the Home and School Association. They serve as the first link in the communication chain between the parents and the school.

Even though its main focus has changed, fundraising is still an important function of the Home and School Association. The Home and School through fundraising is able to support many activities around the school that benefit both the family and the staff. Every year Home and School allocates \$200 to each teacher to be used to purchase supplies for their classrooms, which the school does not supply. Over the past years Home and School has been able to purchase much-needed desks and chairs for the classrooms. Two years ago new tables and stools were purchased for the Art room.

In addition to the many school improvements, the Home and School Association sponsors many social events geared toward bringing school and parish families together. These events include dances, skating parties, the Reverse Raffle, Breakfast with Santa, the Christmas Feast, and the Fish Fry. The Home and School is also a big proponent of student enrichment such as the Annual Poetry Festival, which gives students the chance to memorize and recite a poem, while adding their own personality into the rendition. In the past we have financially supported the Music program, Art program and new this year, the Drama Club.

As you can see the Home and School Association is a very active facet of St. Gabriel School. None of what we do would be possible without the support of all our school and parish families. I would personally like to add that being part of the Home and School Association has been a very pleasurable and enriching experience. I care deeply about the school and like having an active

role in its success. The teachers are always willing to voice their appreciation and it is very joyous to know that our work is noticed and appreciated. When asked what the Home and School meant to them as a teacher, Sarah Watson, fifth grade teacher said "To me, the St. Gabriel Home and School means an opportunity for parents and the school to work together on joint projects, like the Christmas Feast. Saint Gabriel the Archangel Victory Tournament

The Saint Gabriel Gators 5th/6th Grade team lost their first 8 games of the season, continuing a losing streak, which began last year for the players and coaches. Due to CYO rules, if a school only has enough boys to field one team, that team is classified as an "A" team, meaning they will be scheduled against the finest teams fielded by other schools, most of whom had enough available players to have a "B" and "C" team as well. Thus, the Gators had a tough season ahead of them in 2005-06.

Coach **Charles Pearsey** developed and planned a tournament for other teams in the same situation as the 5th/6th grade boys, namely winless and with little hope of beating other "A" teams. Three other teams accepted invitations for the tournament, which was played at Holy Trinity's Bockhold Hall, January 28, 2006. The tournament was set up so that the loser of each game would advance to the next round, while the winners were eliminated. In this way, 3 of the 4 teams would win their first game of the season. The teams matching up in the final game would have a pizza and cake party.

St. Gabriel lost in the 1st round to Christ the King, 38-13 while St. Michael lost to St. Thomas Aquinas. St. Gabriel (0-9) and St. Michael (0-8) advanced to the final round. St. Gabriel stayed close to St. Michael but were down, 11-5 when the first half ended. St. Gabriel's shooting was 1-23 from the field.

When the 2nd half started, St. Gabriel's players kicked into high gear. They hit two quick baskets to make the score 11-9. St. Gabriel then continued the run, going ahead 15-13. This was the first time they had led all season. This came about due to excellent passing by

He was a man of strong faith who prayed together with his wife. He served as an usher at church for many years. Bob worked in sales for Kraft Foods. He was transferred from Michigan to Indianapolis in 1965 and settled his family in St. Gabriel Parish and School. He loved to work in the yard and ride his mower. His lawn was the best on the block. FIRST NATIONAL ENCOUNTER FOR HISPANIC YOUTH & YOUNG ADULT MINISTRY

It is a pleasure to have an opportunity to write this article about the long process of the "Encuentro for Hispanic Young People" (Encounter). This long process began with the parochial encounter in the summer of 2005 in every parish, involved in Hispanic ministry throughout our local Archdiocese. It was also being experienced in many Catholic parishes in the United States. An event will be held in this coming June at Notre Dame University as part of the continuing national vision of the Encuentro.

Last November, the Archdiocesan encounter was held in Bloomington, in which 60 young adults and 40 teenagers from more than ten parishes participated. It was a wonderful experience! Equally important, was the opportunity of meeting many of the young people from these parishes as we discussed topics and shared ideas on how to continue creating new ways of broadcasting the information about the Encuentro in order to develop a national pastoral plan the Church as whole may use.

On a more regional level, we had the Encuentro which took place in Grand Rapids, Michigan. There we had the opportunity to participate as a Hispanic Archdiocesan community. Twenty-two young adults from around 10 parishes were present and we interacted with 21 dioceses from the Midwest region. The region covers five states which are: Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Ohio and Wisconsin (Episcopal Regions VI & VII). We were excited to be part of those twenty two people who represented our Archdiocese. It was a wonderful experience of socializing, praying, learning, and getting to know other parishioners, priests, and even bishops, who shared the same vision on Hispanic ministry.

The next encounter is going to be a national event and we hope to be present to once again represent our Archdiocese. As an organizer of these events, I plan to be present and hope to have several others attend with me as well. It has always been a pleasure to participate in such events and I look forward to participating once again as way to serve the young people of our community.

The theme for this encounter is "Weaving the Future Together". This encounter has a national resonance because we will be together at Notre Dame University in June as we move forward in our desire to learn, share and apply our pastoral skills to better serve the needs both young and adults in our Archdioceses. As such, our parish community continues to participate in the process at the national level.

Once again, I am grateful for this opportunity to able to briefly share these experiences of the 'Encuentro.' Please continue to pray for the youth and young adults not just in our local community, but throughout the world: they are the future of the Church.

project was the school. The brand new concept adult daycare emerged. After much study, hard work and grant writing, Holy Trinity Place, the first free standing adult daycare facility in the Midwest and the first adult daycare in Marion County, opened its doors in 1980. It is still in operation today, as part of Catholic Charities, serving about 35 clients daily. Another important development during his pastorate at Holy Trinity was the founding of WESCO the neighborhood association by the parishioners. Fr. Crawford served as its president. When the Catholic Center was completed, Catholic Charities moved out of the building at Holy Trinity and it was turned into a shelter for battered women and their children. Of course, this fact was not advertised due to the nature of this ministry. The church celebrated its Diamond Anniversary, 75 years, while Fr. Crawford was serving there. It was celebrated with a special Mass celebrated by the Archbishop. Again, Fr. Crawford made an impression on the leadership of the church. That impression landed him his next assignment as Director of Pro Life Activities for the Archdiocese.

Before starting this assignment Fr. Crawford took a week to this office in other dioceses around the country. Contrary to popular belief, the Office for Pro Life Activities does not just deal with abortion issues but runs the gambit of life issues. For instance, when the U.S. invaded Iraq in 1990, it was the responsibility of this office to have the position of the Catholic Church on a Justifiable War in the hands of those serving the Archdiocese so it could be communicated to the faithful. Fr. Crawford held this position for 14 years in which time the Office of Pro Life Activities received national recognition and several awards for its work.

As if being the Director of the Office of Pro Life Activities was not a full time job, Fr. Crawford also served as Pastor to several churches in that time - Holy Name, Indianapolis, St. Mary St. Michael, Madison, St. Ann, Indianapolis and St. Simon, Indianapolis.

In 1995, he was called to move the parish of St. Simon from its original location to a new location in Geist. Fr. Crawford walked the church through a long discernment process and the parish council made the decision to move. This involved the building of a new church and the disposal of the original property. They worked with CSO Architects and Shields Sexton Construction to build their new plant which included a church, a school with three classrooms per grade, gym, social hall and parish offices. With that major task accomplished Fr. Crawford returned to St. Gabriel as its Pastor on January 6, 1999.

When asked to reflect on his 40 years of service to the Archdiocese and the changes in society during that time, Fr. Crawford says he is saddened by the return to conservatism. He feels that many of the changes that people

literally bled for in the last 50 years are being undone. It is also his opinion that the leadership of the church and the country are encouraging this conservatism. In performance of his ministry, Fr. Crawford has drawn inspiration from Pope John XXIII, who was considered an authentic image of the Good Shepherd, and St. Paul, for whom he is named. His other disappointment is that of the 10 in his graduating class only 3 are still in the ministry today. He makes no secret of how challenging it is to meet his calling every single day, and that it is no different than the challenges in our lives and marriages. Words of wisdom that Fr. Crawford shares are that people can be your greatest pain but also your greatest joy.

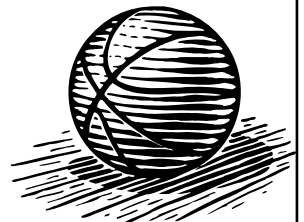

Dylan Griffith (2 assists), **Joshua Mendoza** (2 assists & 2 steals) and **Derek Hamilton** (2 points, 2 assists, 5 rebounds and a steal). Their targets during the 3rd quarter were **James Pearsey** (8 points, 11 rebounds, 1 assist and 2 steals) and **Andrew Brown** (13 points & 4 rebounds).

Both teams gave their best effort in the 4th quarter. The Gators continued to play their best ball of the entire season, stealing the ball 3 times and shooting well. When the final buzzer sounded, St. Gabriel was ahead, 25-17. Their shooting had improved to 10 of 20 in the 2nd half. The Gators made only 7 turnovers this game, a sharp reduction in the 25 per game they averaged during the season.
